Remembering Ransinghji: A Life of Commitment and Service

Ekta Parishad mourns the sudden demise of its National President, Dr. Ransingh Parmar (Ransinghji), aged 72, who passed away on the evening of **13th March** at the Prayog campus in Tilda, Chhattisgarh. He had travelled there to participate in an organisational meeting.

The incident came as a profound shock to all present. Shortly before the evening prayer, Ransinghji was found unresponsive. Immediate efforts were made to revive him through CPR, following which he was rushed to a nearby mission hospital. Despite all attempts, he could not be revived.

Dr. Parmar dedicated nearly five decades of his life to the service of marginalized communities. A committed Gandhian and senior social activist, he worked tirelessly for the rights of the poor, particularly advocating for jal, jangal, and zameen (water, forests, and land). He was closely associated with noted Gandhian Dr. S. N. Subbarao and played a key role in several people's movements and national padayatras led by Ekta Parishad.



Beyond his leadership roles, including National General Secretary of the National Youth Project, Secretary of Mahatma Gandhi Seva Ashram (Jaura), and Trustee of Gandhi Bhavan (Bhopal) Ransinghji was widely respected as an exceptional organiser. Colleagues remember him as a tireless institution builder and a deeply committed human being who worked with sincerity, humility, and unwavering dedication.



On the day of his passing, he had addressed over 500 workers and village leaders gathered at Prayog Ashram, speaking passionately about land rights and their importance in addressing poverty. His words, delivered just hours before his passing, now hold even deeper significance.

Following consultations with his family, arrangements were made to transport his mortal remains from Raipur to his hometown in Gwalior, a journey of nearly 900 kilometres. A prayer meeting was held at Prayog Ashram, where hundreds gathered to pay their respects.

The ambulance carrying him departed Tilda late on the night of 13th March, accompanied by colleagues and fellow members of Ekta Parishad. His final journey concluded on 15th March, when he was laid to rest in his native village, Mrigpura, District Morena, in the presence of thousands of friends, family members, and well-wishers.

Dr. Parmar's passing marks an irreplaceable loss to the Ekta Parishad family and to the wider community of social activists across the country. His lifelong commitment to justice, peace, and nonviolence will continue to inspire generations.

The COSIL – Confluence of Social Impact Leaders was successfully held in CESCI Madurai from 21–23 January 2026, bringing together leaders from Corporate Social Responsibility (CSR), civil society organisations, NGOs, foundations, and other development practitioners from across the country. The three-day gathering created a vibrant platform for dialogue, shared learning, and collaboration among individuals and institutions committed to advancing meaningful social impact.

The event was designed as a space for cross-sector engagement and experiential learning, encouraging participants to reflect on emerging challenges and explore innovative approaches to social transformation. More than 50 leaders and practitioners from different parts of India participated in the programme, contributing their experiences, perspectives, and insights.

During the first two days, CSR leaders and representatives from CSOs and NGOs engaged in a series of interactive sessions focusing on key themes such as sustainability, Environmental, Social and Governance (ESG) practices,

Social Return on Investment (SROI), and the use of Artificial Intelligence for social impact. These discussions helped participants deepen their understanding of new frameworks and tools that can strengthen the effectiveness and accountability of development initiatives.

One of the distinctive features of COSIL was its emphasis on experiential learning. Participants took part in creative modules including pottery, folk arts, simulations, and exposure visits, which encouraged reflection, teamwork, and a deeper appreciation of cultural and community-based approaches to learning and social engagement.

The programme also provided curated spaces for CSR–NGO collaboration, enabling meaningful conversations between organisations seeking to build partnerships for sustainable development initiatives. These interactions helped identify new possibilities for cooperation and strengthened networks among the participants.

From Land Access to Sustainable Livelihoods: The Community Land Trust Model

Rajagopal Ji continues to advocate the Land Trust concept as a way to ensure community stewardship of land, equitable access, and sustainable livelihoods. Community Land Trusts for Sustainable Livelihoods

Ekta Parishad has long championed the struggle for land rights,

enabling more than 2.5 million people in India to access land for housing and cultivation.

The next challenge is ensuring that newly acquired land becomes productive and sustainable. To address this, Ekta Parishad proposes establishing Community Land Trusts supported by Common Facility Centres (CFCs) that will provide farmers with shared machinery, traditional seeds, organic inputs, and market linkages.

Each trust will support 100–150 families, helping them cultivate land sustainably and secure livelihoods. This initiative aims to transform land access into lasting economic dignity and ecological sustainability for marginalized rural communities.
